

Request for an Adjudication Certificate

Section 26(2) of the Building and Construction Industry Security of Payment Act 2009 (Tas) states that an Adjudication Certificate can be issued "if the respondent does not pay to the claimant all of the Adjudicated Amount in accordance with subsection (1)."

Fees: The fee to issue an Adjudication Certificate is dependent on the Adjudicated Amount, as follows:

Adjudicated amount	Up to \$15 000	\$15 001 to \$40 000	\$40 001 to \$750 000	over \$750 000
Fee (inc GST)	\$110	\$330	\$550	\$825

The fee **must** accompany this request and is recoverable from the Respondent in the same proportion as the Adjudicator determined is payable by the Respondent.

Notes for the Guidance of Persons making a Request for an Adjudication Certificate

Section 1

- 1 The request must be lodged with the Nominating Authority which nominated the Adjudicator.
- 2 The request cannot be made before the expiration of both 5 business days after the Adjudicator's Determination was served on the Respondent and the date (determined by the Adjudicator) as the date on which the progress payment became payable.
- 3 The request cannot be made unless the whole or part of the Adjudicated Amount remains unpaid at the date of the request.
- 4 The request must be accompanied by the fee charged by the Nominating Authority for issue of the Adjudication Certificate.
- 5 Completion of Sections 2 and 3 of the Application Form is optional.

Section 2

- 1 Interest **will not** be included in the Adjudication Certificate unless the Claimant completes Section 2.
- 2 Interest must be calculated at the rate determined by the Adjudicator in the Adjudication Determination. Interest is simple interest unless the Adjudicator has determined otherwise.
- 3 In calculating interest, the date upon which the progress payment became payable (as determined by the Adjudicator) should not be included but the date of this application should be included.
- 4 Interest should be calculated only on unpaid amounts. If an amount has been paid, interest is not payable from the date upon which payment was received.
- 5 The interest rate determined by the Adjudicator does not apply to adjudication fees.

RATE PRESCRIBED UNDER THE SUPREME COURT CIVIL PROCEDURE ACT 1932

Calculating interest on amounts owing on or after 1 July 2010:

Adjudicate Today understands that on **1 July 2010**, a change was effected on how the interest rate prescribed under s.165 of the Supreme Court Civil Procedure Act 1932 is calculated.

The website for *Tasmania's Consolidated Legislation Online* confirms at s.5A(3) of the *Supreme Court Rules 2000*, that:

(3) For the purpose of section 165 of the Supreme Court Civil Procedure Act 1932 and rule 887A(1)(b), the prescribed rate of interest for a calendar year, or for part of a calendar year, is a rate equal to 6% plus-

- (a) for the period commencing on 1 January in a calendar year and ending on 30 June in that year, or for part of that period, the last cash rate published by the Reserve Bank of Australia before that 1 January; and*
- (b) for the period commencing on 1 July in a calendar year and ending on 31 December in that year, or for part of that period, the last cash rate published by the Reserve Bank of Australia before that 1 July.*

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- Calculating interest on amounts owing from 1 July 2010 to 31 December 2010:**
 On 1 July 2010, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 July 2010 was 4.5%.

On the basis of the above information, Adjudicate Today understands that for amounts owing between **1 July 2010 and 31 December 2010 inclusive**, the rate prescribed under s.165 of the Supreme Court Civil Procedure Act 1932 is **10.5%**.
- Calculating interest on amounts owing from 1 January 2011 to 31 December 2011:**
 On 1 January 2011, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 January 2011 was 4.75%. On 1 July 2011, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 July 2011 was again 4.75%.

On the basis of the above information, Adjudicate Today understands that for amounts owing **from 1 January 2011 to 31 December 2011 inclusive**, the rate prescribed under s.165 of the Supreme Court Civil Procedure Act 1932 is **10.75%**.
- Calculating interest on amounts owing from 1 January 2012 to 30 June 2012:**
 On 1 January 2012, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 January 2012 was 4.25%.

On the basis of the above information, Adjudicate Today understands that for amounts owing **from 1 January 2012 to 30 June 2012**, the rate prescribed under s.165 of the Supreme Court Civil Procedure Act 1932 is **10.25%**.
- Calculating interest on amounts owing from 1 July 2012 to 31 December 2012:**
 On 1 July 2012, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 July 2012 was 3.5%.

On the basis of the above information, Adjudicate Today understands that for amounts owing **from 1 July 2012 to 31 December 2012**, the rate prescribed under s.165 of the Supreme Court Civil Procedure Act 1932 is **9.5%**.
- Calculating interest on amounts from 1 January 2013 to 30 June 2013**
 On 1 January 2013, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 January 2013 was 3%.

On the basis of the above information, Adjudicate Today understands that for amounts owing **from 1 January 2013 to 30 June 2013**, the rate prescribed under s.101 of the Civil Procedure Act is **9%**.
- Calculating interest on amounts owing from 1 July 2013 to 31 December 2013:**
 On 1 July 2013, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 July 2013 was 2.75%.

On the basis of the above information, Adjudicate Today understands that for amounts owing **from 1 July 2013 to 31 December 2013**, the rate prescribed under s.101 of the Civil Procedure Act is **8.75%**.

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- Calculating interest on amounts owing from 1 January 2014 to 30 June 2015**

On 1 January 2014, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 January 2014 was 2.5%.

On the basis of the above information, Adjudicate Today understands that for amounts owing **from 1 January 2014 to 30 June 2015**, the rate prescribed under s.165 of the Supreme Court Civil Procedure Act 1932 is **8.5%**.
- Calculating interest on amounts owing from 1 July 2015 to 30 June 2016**

On 1 July 2015, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 July 2015 was 2%.

On the basis of the above information, Adjudicate Today understands that for amounts owing **from 1 July 2015 to 30 June 2016**, the rate prescribed under s.165 of the Supreme Court Civil Procedure Act 1932 is **8%**.
- Calculating interest on amounts owing from 1 July 2016 to 31 December 2016**

On 1 July 2016, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 July 2016 was 1.75%.

On the basis of the above information, Adjudicate Today understands that for amounts owing **from 1 July 2016 to 31 December 2016** the rate prescribed under s.101 of the Civil Procedure Act is **7.75%**.
- Calculating interest on amounts owing on and from 1 January 2017**

On 1 January 2017, the website for the Reserve Bank of Australia confirmed that the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank before 1 January 2017 was 1.5%.

On the basis of the above information, Adjudicate Today understands that for amounts owing **on and from 1 January 2017** the rate prescribed under s.101 of the Civil Procedure Act is **7.5%**.

 - Note that if the Due Date for Payment as determined by the Adjudicator is prior to **31 December 2010**, the Claimant will need to complete **nine individual calculations** in order to determine the total interest payable.

6 The formula which may be used to calculate simple interest payable is as follows:

$$I = A \times \frac{\text{Days}}{365} \times \text{Rate of interest}$$

Where:

I = Interest due

A = Adjudicated Amount including any gst, as shown on the Adjudication Determination

Days = Number of full days which have elapsed since the Due Date for Payment.

The Due Date for Payment is shown on the Adjudication Determination.

Rate of interest = Rate of interest as shown on the Adjudication Determination

* In all cases, the Claimant **must** make its own enquiries to satisfy itself of the relevant rate of interest.

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EXAMPLE ONLY	Calculation	Interest due
If A = \$110,000 including any gst Days = 31 Rate = 7.5%	then I = \$110,000 x $\frac{31}{365}$ x 7.5%	I = \$700.68

*Be sure to refer to points 1-6 of Section 2 when calculating interest.

Section 3

- 1 If the Claimant has paid the Respondent's share (or part of the Respondent's share) of the fees of the Nominating Authority or the Adjudicator, the Claimant should complete Section 3 and provide the Nominating Authority with proof of payment.
- 2 Proof of payment may be by receipts, a statement by the Claimant's accountant, a statutory declaration or a statement by a person who is able to certify as to payment and non reimbursement.

Declaration

- 1 The Claimant must complete the declaration at the foot of the Application Form.
If the Claimant is a company then an officer duly authorised by the company should complete the Application Form.
